There will be staff who work at the Transit Museum. They will be at tents or buses. They will help everyone stay safe and take turns. I will listen to their directions. If I have a question or need help, I can ask them. They will be wearing orange t-shirts that say New York Transit Museum on the front.



We can go to a Transit Museum tent to ask for fans, temporary tattoos, and a Bus Festival scavenger hunt. We can also find the Education tent to make a bus depot button.



If we want to buy a souvenir, we can visit the tent for the Transit Museum store.



When we are finished visiting all the buses that we want to see, my group can leave Bus Festival and the park together.
